

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


Fig. 1 — Typical Output Characteristics
 $T_c = 25^\circ\text{C}$




Fig. 2 — Typical Output Characteristics
 $T_c = 150^\circ\text{C}$




Fig. 3 — Typical Transfer Characteristics




Fig. 4 — Normalized On-Resistance Vs. Temperature




Fig. 5 — Typical Capacitance Vs. Drain-to-Source Voltage




Fig. 6 — Typical Gate Charge Vs. Gate-to-Source Voltage

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


Fig. 7 — Typical Source-to-Drain Diode Forward Voltage




Fig. 8 — Maximum Safe Operating Area




Fig. 9 — Maximum Drain Current Vs. Case Temperature

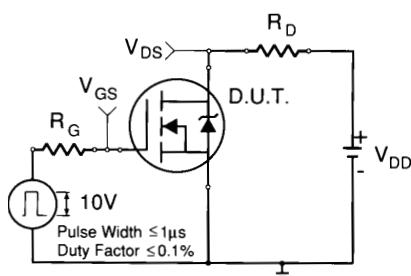


Fig. 10a — Switching Time Test Circuit

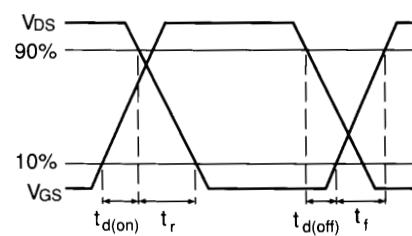


Fig. 10b — Switching Time Waveforms




Fig. 11 — Maximum Effective Transient Thermal Impedance, Junction-to-Case Vs. Pulse Duration




Fig. 12a — Unclamped Inductive Test Circuit




Fig. 12b — Unclamped Inductive Waveforms




Fig. 12c — Max. Avalanche Energy vs. Current





Fig. 13a — Gate Charge Test Circuit


