
Another valuable type of reflecting galvanometer is the Deprez-D'Arsonval dead-beat galvanometer (Fig. 5), or, as it is commonly called, the D'Arsonval galvanometer.

This type of instrument has won favor with all, on account of



its great delicacy of action, simplicity, and convenience. In a recent article in the *London Electrician*, Professor W. E. Ayrton gives it as his opinion, that, properly constructed, this type of galvanometer, is the most sensitive instrument known for the detection or measurement of electrical quantities. It is one of the finest of the "dead-beat" variety; and the needle, after being deflected, returns to its zero position immediately, and without the slightest oscillation, while it is so sensitive that it may easily be



deflected through a considerable arc by simply touching the fingers to the two terminals of the instrument. The induction-currents produced by turning a coil of wire about a diameter so as to cut the earth's lines of force may also be rendered visible to an entire

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
