PROFESSOR EINSTEIN AT THE CALIFORNIA INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

ADDRESSES AT THE DINNER IN HIS HONOR¹

MR. ALLAN C. BALCH, PRESIDENT OF THE ATHENAEUM:

This is a dinner of some two hundred California Institute Associates, held at the Athenaeum, a building designed as a club house and meeting center for three groups of people: First, the staffs of the three adjacent cooperating institutions, the California Institute of Technology, the Mount Wilson Observatory of the Carnegie Institution of Washington and the Henry E. Huntington Library and Art Gallery; second, eastern and foreign scholars who are drawn to this research and educational center for participation in, or some sort of association with, its activities; third, the group of residents of this Southern California community known as the California Institute Associates, who are interested in and promotors
