## The AAAS Southwestern and Rocky Mountain Division— **How a Regional Division Operates**

The forthcoming AAAS Annual Meeting in Denver (20-25 February 1977), the 143rd national meeting of the Association, is also the 53rd annual meeting of the AAAS Southwestern and Rocky Mountain Division (SWARM). What follows is a description of the origins and functions of the division.

#### Origin

The Southwestern Division of the AAAS was organized to satisfy a regional need for communication, exchange, and "companionship among fellow workers" in the scientific disciplines (1). The initiative for founding this division resided in AAAS members at widely separated institutions across the Southwest.

In March 1920, an astronomer and a botanist (2) from Tucson toured the colleges and universities of Arizona, New Mexico, and west Texas to recruit scientists for a regional organization (1). Following a convening of southwestern delegates in Tucson on 10 April, the AAAS Executive Committee formally authorized a regional division on 26 April 1920. The first division meeting was held in El Paso, Texas, December of that

Though this first meeting was organizational in purpose, 27 scientific papers were presented in addition to about a dozen special addresses, general talks, and a symposium—"What Are the Problems on Which the Southwestern Division Should Concentrate?" One afternoon Ciudad Juarez provided streetcars to carry members and ladies across the border to a Juarez theater as guests of that city for a joint meeting. Papers were read by the Mexican members and invited speakers, followed by visits to points of interest in Juarez (3).

Until 1953, the division consisted of AAAS members resident in Arizona, New Mexico, Texas (west of the 100th meridian), Colorado, and the Mexican states of Sonora and Chihuahua. With the incorporation of Wyoming and that part of Montana east of the continental divide, the name was changed in 1953 to the Southwestern and Rocky Mountain Division (SWARM) of the AAAS. The Oklahoma panhandle joined the division in 1958. All AAAS members who reside within the defined boundaries are division members without further dues payment.

Finances, Administration, and Officers

In 1976–77 the AAAS appropriated to SWARM the requested budget of \$7000 (approximately \$1.50 for each of the 4725 members). This annual budget pays for printing and mailing the call for papers and the program for the annual meeting.

The division Executive Officer, who is appointed by the Executive Committee for an indeterminate period, represents the division on the AAAS Council. He receives no reimbursement except for expenses to national and regional meetings. His office serves as the executive headquarters for SWARM.

All other officers are elected by ballot of division members at the time of the annual call for papers. The President accedes to his office from the position of President-elect.

A regional division formulates its own bylaws which are structured within the framework of the AAAS constitution. No conflict of interest nor question of autonomy has ever arisen between the AAAS and the Southwestern and Rocky Mountain Division.

Seven active sections currently operate within the division: (i) arid zone studies, (ii) botanical sciences, (iii) physical sciences, (iv) psychology, (v) science education, (vi) social sciences, and (vii) zoological sciences. Sections function regionally only in preparation for and during the annual meeting.

#### Meetings

The SWARM constitution states that an additional purpose for founding a division was to further the objectives of the

Association through meetings and conferences held within the division boundaries. The current AAAS President, the AAAS Executive Officer, or both, represent the Association at each regional meeting. These meetings, which rotate among the principal educational institutions of the region, are scheduled in different states in consecutive years. Since 1973, the host state's Academy of Science, which meets jointly with the division, has published the abstracts. The registration charge at a meeting includes the cost of abstracts and defrays local expenses.

#### **Advantages of Regional Divisions**

The small regional meetings provide general sessions which bring together, professionally and socially, persons with dissimilar training and diverse backgrounds. To encourage student participation in division meetings, SWARM in 1975 adopted a policy of making a cash award to the author of the best student paper presented in each section.

Certain programs and special projects of SWARM have attracted attention far beyond the division boundaries. The John Wesley Powell lectures, representing a wide diversity of scientific endeavor, have been featured at national AAAS meetings when held within the division boundaries. The division has published papers from symposia on Desert and Arid Zones research (1957-1974) as well as the Arid Lands Newsletter (1960-

SWARM continues to satisfy the needs that called forth its establishment. It has adjusted to the changing times and still provides "companionship of fellow workers" as well as an outlet for reports of research by investigators of all ages.


