A name for a certain kind of note(s) occurring in a rāga by Haresh Bakshi

We are familiar with the terms used in connection with the inclusion/exclusion of notes(s) in a rāga. To recapitulate, those terms are: vādī for the most important note in a rāga, samvādī for the next important note, anuvādi for the remaining notes occurring in the rāga, vivādī for those notes NOT occurring in the rāga.

However, among the anuvādi notes, some particular anuvādi note enjoys greater importance than the remaining anuvādi notes. An example: the importance of pañcama in the rāga yamana. Such a note, though an anuvādi, yet deserves a special treatment and place.

We propose to call such notes prānuvādī. Thus a prānuvādī is an anuvādi note enjoying special place owing to its special aesthetical significance.
